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art of the appeal of Simon's Town, the False Bay settlement widely known for its naval base and ubiquitous penguins, are its rows of heritage buildings, from broekie-lace fronted Victorians to simple structures dating back hundreds of years. History is all about, something proud locals like to flaunt. Theirs is a community that's closely knit, brimming with delicious yarns, and it draws those who might have moved on back to its charming corners and mellow little coves time and again.

Colleen Nugent spent childhood holidays with her family in a tiny wooden bungalow close to Seaforth beach, and has happy memories of those times. When, many years later, a friend arranged a weekend away at the town's Boulders beach, renting characterful cottages that were formerly an old tuck shop and an ammunitions storage facility during the Anglo-Boer War respectively, Colleen's fondness for the area was reignited. Soon she'd be bringing her own family to these same quaint bolt holes for breaks from their city life in Cape Town.

They loved renting those cottages so much, she says, that they decided to look for a house of their own in Simon's Town. Fortuitously, they came across an empty plot for sale, with direct access to the beach via a path to the boardwalk – a rare find for this area, even 11 years ago.

'We wanted to build in keeping with the surroundings,' Colleen says, describing rough plans sketched by her frequently travelling husband on an aeroplane sick bag – now framed, of course. They approached Pieter Silberbauer of Rustic Homes to bring the drawings to life: a double-storey wooden structure with wide, wraparound verandas, crowned with a loft. Within six months it was masterfully, almost effortlessy built. Just about the only thing Rustic Homes don't do is landscape your garden, says Colleen, whose preference anyway is for a 'wild' garden lush with greenery and shady nooks such as their own.

A new build it might be, but the Nugent's quite magical seaside house couldn't be more in its place among some 'very old, very cute' heritage properties, including what was once a whaling station. Painted a fresh icy pink and set in its tangle of garden against the sweeping backdrop of the ever-changing sea and sky, it's a picture of enchantment.





While the ocean views are one of its most captivating features, so too are the interiors. A beach house in every sense of the word, with jaunty nautical references such as portholes in the loos and carnivalesque bunting fluttering from veranda posts, it defies the traditional blue-and-white look of the coastal vernacular.

It is, rather, homely, colourful and multi-layered with interesting things at every turn, from a framed picture of a sailboat that Colleen found in the garden to the carnival cutout she received as a gift. There are time-worn pieces that were never meant to be for sale, but which Colleen singled out from obscure corners with her 'eagle eye': an ancient Union Jack casually draped over a sofa, a cherished piece of embroidered silk strung up on a wall. She has a weakness for Cath Kidston fabric, which has found its way onto a chaise longue and cupboard 'curtains' in the kitchen. 'I've only ever bought what I love,' she says. "They are all things I want to see and enjoy."

Sleeping seven, with two bedrooms on the ground floor, an ensuite gazing over the sea on the upper floor, and another bed in the attic, it is at once spacious and delectably cosy. With the doors all open there's a breezy flow between outdoors and in, but as the chill sets in, the house comes into its own when the Queen Anne fireplace is lit. 'It's wonderful here in winter,' Colleen muses.

That's when board games are brought out from cupboards piled high with them, as well as books and magazines. In the dark of night you might even hear the haunting sound of whales just off the beach. Just another reason to fall head over heels for Sorbet Cottage. Corbet Cottage is available for holiday rentals through Perfect Hideaways, perfecthideaways.co.za

There are many things to love about Simon's Town - the unique Boulders beach where you can swim alongside the penguins; listening to the whales in the dead of night; the old-world atmosphere and beautiful Victorian buildings in the town; the good community spirit... And it's not too commercialised yet! There's a feeling of escaping into another world yet it's only 40 minutes from Cape Town. My favourite spots in the house are the main bedroom/bathroom, and the hammock corner on the top floor veranda. All have the most spectacular views - like a painting with the scene constantly changing, whether it's the weather or the sea life (penguins, dolphins, whales), boats of every description and the sound of people enjoying the beach below. I'm inspired by my children, Phoebe and Gabriel, and nature in every form. Oh, and my two Airedale hounds, Paddington and Ted!
